Council of Europe Action Plan for Ukraine 2008 - 2011

Document Prepared by the Directorate of Strategic Planning

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Introduction

Since Ukraine joined the Organisation, and even during the pre-accession process, the Council of Europe has successfully implemented a number of co-operation programmes with the Ukrainian authorities. This new proposed Action Plan builds on the achievements of previous co-operation frameworks, notably the Action Plan 2005-2008, and aims at intensifying co-operation to support the Ukrainian authorities to fulfil the country's European ambitions and commitments towards the Council of Europe.

Ukraine's post-accession commitments are enshrined in Parliamentary Assembly Opinion 190 (1995). In Resolution 1346 (2003), the Parliamentary Assembly concluded that, although notable progress had been made in the field of legislation since the adoption of Resolution 1262 (2001), the country had not yet honoured all obligations and commitments it entered into on becoming a member state. The Assembly acknowledged further significant progress in Resolution 1466 (2005), including the entering into effect of new Codes of Civil Procedure and of Administrative Justice, and of a Law on public financing of political parties.

Furthermore, the Commissioner for Human Rights¹ and the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities² of the Council of Europe also provided their recommendations as to how democracy, the rule of law and human rights can be further strengthened in the country.

In general, the Council of Europe and its various bodies will pursue dialogue with the government authorities at all levels, under its ongoing process to monitor the fulfilment of Ukraine's post-accession commitments.

The proposed Action Plan has been jointly prepared by the Council of Europe and the Ukrainian authorities with the assistance of the Office of the Representative of the Secretary General for the coordination of co-operation programmes (RSG). It provides for a comprehensive package of priority actions of the Organisation to better align Ukrainian legislation, institutions and practice with European standards, in the areas of Council of Europe's expertise such as human rights, democracy and the rule of law.

The proposed Action Plan aims at enhancing the following sectors: electoral reform; the fight against corruption in political, economic and administrative areas; reform of the administration of justice, of law enforcement agencies, media, protection of minorities strengthening of democratic political culture and pluralism in the society, social cohesion, education, culture, youth policies and sport. It also provides for a basis of co-operation in the areas of local democracy and penitentiary reform.

It should be noted that at present the Constitution is deemed to contain a number of provisions that may need further clarification. Settlement of such issues would help strengthen democratic institutions and pluralist democracy in Ukraine. Currently, the Venice Commission is involved in a number of activities in Ukraine such as constitutional and electoral reform and will provide its expertise for the benefit of the Ukrainian institutions.

The co-operation process should also take account of the need to look beyond the capital, to develop a greater involvement of the regions, in particular through local democracy projects. A geographical extension of activities may require improved organisational capacity and extra costs, but this will be outweighed by the benefits of reaching out to the regions in a manner that would help overcome regional divides and increase the influence of the regions.

Ukraine's stated commitment to fulfilling the Copenhagen criteria can be further supported by additional targeted assistance through structured trilateral co-operation between the Council of Europe, the European Union and the Ukrainian authorities.

The opening of the Council of Europe Office of the RSG has already given a significant boost to this process; co-operation with the European Union will also benefit from greater and more concerted on-the-spot co-ordination, ensuring better programme implementation. Both the RSG and the Council of Europe Information Office will contribute to an increased visibility and impact of Council of Europe co-operation in Ukraine, and to ensuring a sustained role for the Organisation in contributing to Ukraine's progress towards full integration in Europe as a State fully observant of human rights, pluralist democracy and the rule of law.

Co-operation proposals are presented under six main areas of co-operation. Specific project outlines are listed under each area, presented in chronological order and indicating funding status.

The Action Plan is a strategic tool with a duration of approximately thirty-six months that brings together actions funded by the Organisation's Ordinary Budget, actions funded under EC/CoE Joint Programmes and Voluntary Contributions, and assistance funded under the budget of the Council of Europe's Venice Commission.

The Action Plan will be reviewed periodically with a view to assessing implementation of approved projects and incorporating other relevant projects. It is envisaged that projects concerning penitentiary reform and interparliamentary co-operation could be included in the Plan at a later stage.

Financial implications

The proposed Action Plan 2008-2011 provides for the follow up of on-going co-operation between the Council of Europe and Ukraine, and for the reinforcement of co-operation in key priority areas.

A review of existing co-operation activities and projects has led to a partial re-allocation of available resources in line with co-operation priorities.

On-going EC/CoE Joint Programmes will also be subject to revision, within the constraints imposed by the contractual agreements with the European Commission.

Additional funding will be required to support new actions and an expanded scope of co-operation. The Council of Europe will seek such funding, both within the framework of new EC/CoE joint initiatives, and through voluntary contributions from CoE Member States and Observer States.

A summary of financial information is presented in the Appendix.

I. PROTECTION AND PROMOTION OF HUMAN RIGHTS

Ukraine is one of the countries with the highest number of applications to the ECtHR. Typical issues of concern are: the length of proceedings in civil and criminal cases, non-execution of domestic judicial decisions, violations of the requirement of legal certainty and judicial independence, length of pre-trial detention and detention-related problems (quality of premises, medical care, etc.). Because of this, the capacity to implement the Convention must be strengthened. Efforts to train key professional groups on the ECHR must be continued. Judges, prosecutors, lawyers, law enforcement officials, NGOs, staff of the Ombudsman and the Government Agent for the ECtHR, and staff of penitentiary institutions should be further trained on ECHR standards and ECtHR case law. Co-operation activities should also be continued as regards the execution of ECtHR judgments.

The European Committee for the Prevention of Torture (CPT) has identified in its reports a serious problem of ill-treatment of persons detained by the police. This problem has also been emphasised by the CoE Commissioner for Human Rights, the UN Committee Against Torture and other international organisations. This is aggravated by the absence of an effective system for investigating complaints of ill-treatment. Therefore, targeted efforts are needed to combat ill-treatment and impunity in Ukraine, and to set up mechanisms and procedures for effective investigation of such complaints in line with CPT standards, ECtHR case law and other international instruments.

In the field of media, some progress has been made as regards the legislative framework, but a number of laws require amendment. Media activities will comprise three main elements: 1) Legislative framework; 2) Adoption of a professional Code of Ethics for journalists and improved standards of their reporting; 3) Improved co-operation and dialogue between media, civil society and state institutions.

The following projects are being implemented or are proposed in this area:

1.1. Strengthening the application of the European Convention on Human Rights

Project 1. <u>Improving the protection and observance of human rights by enhancing the capacity of specific target groups (legal professions: judges, prosecutors, lawyers) and institutions of Ukraine (including the Government Agent) in using European human rights standards and norms in their everyday work</u>

Objectives:

Enhance a European culture of Human Rights in the countries of the South Caucasus and Ukraine, in line with their aspirations to membership or closer ties with the European Union by enhancing education, training, monitoring and awareness of European Human Rights standards and by reinforcing the work of international human rights mechanisms inter alia through the promotion of the observance and implementation of the European Social Charter (revised);

Support Ukraine and South Caucasus states in preparing education policy guidelines inter alia to consolidate democratic citizenship, pluralist democracy and human rights through the development of inter-cultural and inter-faith dialogue in education institutions;

Improve the protection and observance of human rights by strengthening the legislative framework and enhancing the capacity of specific target groups and institutions of Ukraine in using European human rights standards and norms in their everyday work;

These objectives will be achieved through expert support to national structures, NGOs and civil society within three broad areas of CoE competence: Human Rights training; Human Rights education and awareness-raising in European human rights standards.

Project 2. <u>Setting up an active network of independent non-judicial Human Rights structures</u> (multilateral Programme).

Ukraine is one of the beneficiaries of the EC/CoE JP "Setting up an active network of independent non-judicial Human Rights structures" (the Programmes involve 13 countries of Eastern and South-Eastern Europe).

This programme aims at building the capacity of national non-judicial human rights structures, promoting their independence and networking between them (this JP was initiated by the CoE Human Rights Commissioner).

Project 3. <u>Consolidating the capacity of specific target groups (legal professions: judges, prosecutors, lawyers) and institutions of Ukraine in using European human rights standards and norms in their everyday work</u>

Objective:

Follow up the JP "Fostering a Culture of Human Rights" and consolidate a European culture of human rights in Ukraine by developing education, training, monitoring and awareness of European human rights standards, based on the results and lessons learnt from the above-mentioned on-ongoing project and targeting those areas most in need;

Develop further the protection and observance of human rights by consolidating the legislative framework and enhancing the capacity of specific target groups and institutions in Ukraine in using European human rights standards and norms in their everyday work;

The objective will be achieved through expert support to national structures, NGOs and civil society within three broad areas of CoE competence: human rights training; human rights education and awareness-raising in European human rights standards.

1.2. Freedom of expression and information and freedom of the media

The following project is proposed in this area:

Project 1. Promotion of European Standards in the Ukrainian Media Environment

Duration: August 2008- April 2010

Implementation status: on-going project

Funding status:	funding secured through the EC/CoE JP 'Promotion of European Standards in the Ukrainian Media Environment "(90% EC; 10% CoE)
Partners:	National Commission on Freedom of Speech and Development of the Media, Ministry of Justice, Parliament

The overall objective of the project is to raise standards of journalism with a view to ensuring that the Ukrainian public is better informed about political and social processes in Ukraine. In order to achieve this, the project will work in three distinct, but related, areas.

Continue providing support to the process of enhancing the legislative framework for media;

Raise ethical standards in the journalism profession;

Supporting the ongoing dialogue between the media, civil society and the state administration.

1.3. Fight against ill-treatment

The following project is proposed:

Project 1. <u>Improving the response of national authorities to the allegations of ill-treatment by</u> <u>law enforcement agencies and investigative structures</u>

This project is part of the proposed EC/CoE JP 'Combating ill-treatment', which involves the countries of the South Caucasus, Ukraine and Moldova.

Duration: Implementation status:	24 months; start: January 2009 (tentative) proposed project; under negotiation with the EC.
Funding status:	funding to be secured through the proposed EC/CoE JP 'Combating ill-treatment' (EC 50% CoE 50%),
Partners:	Offices of the Prosecutors General, Ministries of Interior, supervisory, investigative and complaints handling structures, executive, judicial and legislative institutions, Ombudsman institutions, Bar Associations, OPCAT bodies, Penitentiary Administration and NGOs

Objectives:

Strengthen the effectiveness of investigations into allegations of torture at the domestic level and highlight the importance of imposing appropriate sanctions if guilt is proven, and to counter any notion of impunity. The project will be based on the case-law of the European Court of Human Rights (ECtHR) and the recommendations of the European Committee for the Prevention of Torture (CPT).

1.4. Protection of national minorities' rights

The following activity is proposed:

Project 1. Strengthening the state capacity on minority issues

Funding status:	funding secured by the Ordinary budget Programme "Protecting and promoting the rights of persons belonging to national minorities" (2008/DGHL/1407)
Partners:	State Committee on Minorities, other State authorities

To bring the legislation on the protection of national minorities in line with European standards.

II. RULE OF LAW

The EU Ukraine Summit held in Kyiv on 14 September 2007 reaffirmed the need for further progress in the rule of law, reform of the judiciary and fight against corruption in Ukraine, not least as a means to improve the business and investment climate in the country. The Parties stressed the importance of the implementation of the revised Action Plan on Justice, Freedom and Security endorsed by the EU-Ukraine co-operation Council on 18 June 2007.

The Revised Action Plan on Justice, Freedom and Security, discussed by the EU - Ukraine JLSMinisterial Troika on 4 October 2007, states that the main challenge and strategic aim for this cooperation is 'to continue working with Ukraine to ensure the application of the principles of the rule of law, independence and efficiency of the judiciary, including access to justice and good governance'.

This revised Action Plan sets out a number of agreed areas and objectives for co-operation and implementation, which includes justice issues. It further develops Point IV Justice and the actions which should be undertaken in order to solve the problems of the judiciary in Ukraine.

The following projects are being implemented or are proposed in this area:

2.1 Signature and/or ratification of CoE legal instruments

Promotion of ratification of:

- the European Convention on Transfrontier Television and its additional Protocol;
- European Code of Social Security (assistance projects are included in Appendix);
- Unratified articles of the European Social Charter (see under Section V.)
- Council of Europe Convention on Action Against Trafficking in Human Beings
- Council of Europe Convention on Laundering, Search, Seizure and Confiscation of the Proceeds from Crime and on the Financing of Terrorism
- Council of Europe Convention on the Protection of Children against Sexual Exploitation and Sexual Abuse
- Second Additional Protocol to the European Convention on Mutual Assistance in Criminal Matters

2.2 Independence and functioning of the judicial system

Project 1. Support to the reform of the judicial system

Duration:	June 2008 – December 2010
Implementation status:	on-going project
Funding status:	funding to be secured through the proposed EC/CoE JP "Transparency and efficiency of judicial system in Ukraine" (EC 90% CoE 10%)
Partners:	High Council of Justice of Ukraine, Supreme Court of Ukraine, State Court Administration, Ministry of Justice and other institutions represented in the Steering Committee, Academy of General Prosecutor Office, High Administrative Court

Objectives:

The overall objective of the Programme is to assist with the establishment of an independent, impartial, efficient and professional judiciary in Ukraine, and to ensure that the Ukrainian judiciary is transformed into a transparent and fair judicial system that is accessible to all citizens, working effectively and transparently vis-à-vis citizens and civil society.

Co-ordinated actions will take place in three main areas: access to justice, performance of the judiciary, and transparency and accountability of the judicial system.

The project aims to promote fair access to justice for all, based on the rule of law and respect of common European democratic values and standards. The quality of judgements shall be further perfected, independence of judges guaranteed and general confidence and satisfaction of the citizens substantially increased.

A possibility of cooperation with the Academy of General Prosecutor Office and the High Administrative Court will be explored.

2.3. Fights against corruption, organised crime and terrorism

The following projects are being implemented or are proposed:

Project 1. Project against corruption in Ukraine

Duration:	June 2006 – July 2009
Implementation status:	on-going project
8	funding secured through the EC/CoE JP "UPAC- Project against corruption" (EC 86% CoE 14%),
Partners:	Ministry of Justice as main counterpart, Ministry on Internal Affairs, Security Service, General Prosecutor Office

Objectives:

Contribute to the prevention and control of corruption, so that it no longer undermines the confidence of the public in the political and judicial system, democracy, the rule of law and economic and social development in Ukraine.

Improve the strategic and institutional framework against corruption in Ukraine.

Enhance capacities for the prevention of corruption.

Strengthen the anti-corruption legal framework and effective and impartial enforcement of the criminal legislation on corruption.

Project 2. Ukraine - Project against Money Laundering and Terrorist Financing

Duration:	May 2006 – April 2009

Objectives:

Contribute to the prevention and control of money laundering and terrorist financing in Ukraine in accordance with the European and other international standards and best practices through:

- making Ukraine's legislation compliant with the Third EU Directive on the Prevention of the Use of the Financial System for the Purposes of Money Laundering or Terrorist Financing, and the Council of Europe Convention on Laundering, Search, Seizure and Confiscation of the Proceeds from Crime and on the Financing of Terrorism

- enhancing the human capacities of key institutions of the anti-money laundering system of Ukraine (State Committee for Financial Monitoring, law enforcement agencies and judiciary and financial sector regulators/supervisors)

- developing the organisational and technical infrastructure of the anti-money laundering and counterterrorist financing system.

Project 3. International co-operation in criminal matters

Strengthen the capacities of Ukraine to fully implement European treaties on co-operation in criminal matters;

Strengthen the human and institutional capacities of the Ministry of Justice (MoJ) and of the General Prosecutor Office (GPO) for international co-operation in criminal matters;

Promote networking and direct contacts between MoJ officials and prosecutors with those of neighbouring countries and other European countries.

Project 4. European standards for crime control

Objectives:

Develop effective measures to combat crime, in particular economic and organised crime; Ensure their proper implementation and effective international co-operation;

Develop standards for the laws, procedures and actors in criminal justice;

Ensure the protection of human dignity in detention situations and respect for European standards by law enforcement agencies, to develop restorative justice and to address prevention of crime.

Project 5. Strengthening and protecting women's and children's rights

Duration:	September 2008 – August 2010
Implementation status:	proposed project; under negotiation with the EC.
Partner:	Presidential Secretariat, Ministry of Justice, Parliament, Judiciary, Prosecution Services, Ministry of Internal Affaires, Ministry of Labour and Social Policy, Ministry of Family, Youth and Sport, Social Services
Objectives:	

Examine and improve the compatibility of existing laws and practice in Ukraine in the fields of gender equality and children's rights, and to contribute to the prevention of sexual exploitation and abuse of children in line with the Revised Social Charter, the Council of Europe Convention on the Protection of Children against Sexual Exploitation and Sexual Abuse, and other relevant instruments. Promote in particular ratification of the Council of Europe Convention on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings.

III. ELECTIONS

In light of the next presidential elections in Ukraine, the Council of Europe proposes to provide as in 2007 pre-electoral assistance to support free and fair elections, which might take the form of a specific Action Plan. In 2007, Council of Europe assistance had two major components: legislative and technical assistance provided by the Venice Commission as well as public discussions on democratic

standards for elections organised in co-operation with civil society partners. However, the early calling of elections in 2007 caused a certain number of activities to be postponed.

Further to the request of the Ukrainian authorities (the Parliament of Ukraine and the Ministry of Justice), the Council of Europe could provide assistance in 2008-2009 in the preparation of a Unified Electoral Code for Ukraine. A working group on the Code was set up by Parliament in March 2008 and the Venice Commission has been approached by the representatives of the authorities with a request for its assistance to the working group.

For the next presidential elections, assistance could be provided to the Central Electoral Commission and the High Administrative Court in capacity-building and in training the electoral administrations and judges from courts dealing with complaints and appeals in the electoral field.

In addition to this work on the electoral legislation, the Council of Europe could also provide its support to public discussions on democratic elections with the involvement of civil society representatives, notably in view of the Forum for Future of Democracy which will take place in Kyiv in 2009.

The following projects are being implemented or are proposed:

3.1. Support to improve electoral legislation and practice

Project 1. Improving electoral legislation and practice

Objectives:

Improve electoral legislation and practice;

Assist in drafting the Election Code of Ukraine and legislation of referendums with the aim of rendering national legislation in line with European standards.

Project 2. <u>Assistance in capacity-building to the Central Electoral Commission of Ukraine and training of electoral officials and judges.</u>

Duration:	June 2008 – December 2010
Implementation status:	proposed project for VC funding
Funding status:	funding required
Partners:	Central Electoral Commission of Ukraine, High Administrative Court of Ukraine.

Objectives:

Training of electoral administration and judges: the electoral legislation in Ukraine is constantly changing. Under these circumstances there is a need to provide technical assistance to the bodies responsible for elections in order to ensure a proper training of members of subsidiary electoral commissions and judges of different jurisdictions.

Provide information on best practices and existing legal standards: in order to disseminate information on European standards in the electoral field and make the legal opinions and studies of the Venice Commission available to members of electoral administration and judges in Ukraine, standard-setting documents and legal opinions should be translated into Ukrainian.

3.2. Support public discussions on international standards for democratic elections

Project 1. <u>Round-tables on international standards of democratic elections</u>

Objective:

Support discussions of representatives of civil society on European democratic standards for conducting elections paying attention to the most crucial issues stemming from previous elections.

IV. PROMOTING THE DEMOCRATIC PROCESS, CIVIC PARTICIPATION AND GOOD GOVERNANCE AT LOCAL AND REGIONAL LEVELS

Promoting the democratic process is linked to at least two priority areas of work of the Council of Europe: local democracy and civil society.

The Conference of European Ministers responsible for Local and Regional Government at its 14th session in Budapest (February 2005) adopted the objective of "delivering good local and regional governance". The objective is to be pursued by Member States, also through their cooperation within the Council of Europe through the implementation of the Budapest Agenda between 2005-2010. The Budapest Agenda was endorsed by the 3rd Summit of Heads of State and Government of the Council of Europe in May 2005 and its implementation was reviewed, mid-term, at the 15th session of the Ministerial Conference in Valencia in October 2007.

Civil society development remains one of the priorities of the Council of Europe for promoting democratic development and good governance in Ukraine. Civil society organisations play a key role in involving citizens in decision-making processes and controls, including through active dialogue with the legislative and executive powers.

The INGO Conference of the Council of Europe pays special attention to the improvement and functioning of the regulatory framework for civil society as an important element for promoting citizens' rights and public participation in the political, economic and social spheres. Improvement of relations between NGOs and the national parliament could lead to stronger participation of citizens in public life and in control of institutional bodies.

The main co-operation programme in this sector is the CoE/EC Joint Programme "Setting-up and Developing a Civil Society Leadership Network in Ukraine, Moldova and the Southern Caucasus" 2008-2009 aims at strengthening civil society in Ukraine and its involvement in the solution of political, social, cultural and other problems in the country. It aims at fostering a generation of civil

society leaders who can advocate for democratic policy changes, and promote European standards in democracy, human rights and the rule of law in Ukraine.

The following projects and activities are being implemented or are proposed:

4.1. Local democracy

Project 1. Local and regional democracy

Duration:	January 2008 - December 2008
Implementation status:	on-going project
Funding status:	funding secured through Ordinary budget Programmes "Centre of Expertise for Local Government Reform" (2008/DGDPA/1396) and "Promoting sound decentralisation at local and regional level" (2008/DGDPA/1398). Provide initial support to ongoing legislative reforms in the field of local government and regional development policy in Ukraine, also with a view to prepare further activities targeted to the development of the legal basis for stronger and more viable local and regional self-government (see projects 2 and 3 below).

V. PROMOTING SOCIAL COHESION ("Social Cohesion Programme for Ukraine")

In line with one of the principal recommendations of the High Level Task Force on Social Cohesion and with the political support of the Ukrainian Prime Minister, Ukraine has volunteered to launch a

pilot project in the social cohesion field "Social Cohesion Programme for Ukraine". The programme covers a number of social cohesion-related issues relevant for the country and is an integral part of the Action Plan (included in it as a separate chapter).

In order to identify the priority areas to be included in the Programme, a preliminary list of elements was addressed to the Ukrainian authorities for the consideration, and agreed upon with them.

Ukraine ratified the Revised European Social Charter on 21 December 2006 and will soon face the task of implementing the recommendations of the first report of the European Social Rights Committee; As a complement to the Social Charter, the signature/ratification of the European Code of Social Security has been announced as a priority for the Ukrainian authorities.

Developing the concept and practice of citizens' and patients' participation in the decision-making process affecting health care is a new challenge for Ukraine. Based on the relevant CM recommendation, the Council of Europe is able to assist Ukraine in facing it. Furthermore, in this area, the Ukrainian authorities have expressed the need of having a National Patient Safety Action Plan which could be drafted with the CoE assistance.

Managing migration is also an important challenge for Ukraine and in this respect, the development of reintegration policies and capacity-building of national migration services are areas where the CoE can give practical guidance and support.

The implementation of the CoE Disability Action Plan will further increase the protection of disabled persons in Ukraine.

As far as the Roma are concerned, having already developed some domestic capacity through a CoE/EC Joint Programme, a priority would be now to ensure sustainability of the Ukrainian policies towards Roma, particularly though developing and implementing a National Plan for Roma.

- Development of national and/or regional networks of Roma experts in the various fields addressed by the national plans for Roma (health, education, etc.).

VI. INTERCULTURAL DIALOGUE, CULTURE, EDUCATION, YOUTH AND SPORT

Co-operation with Ukraine in the field of intercultural dialogue has been developed through intergovernmental, bilateral and regional activities in the fields of education, culture and heritage, youth and sport. This co-operation concentrates in particular on educational reforms and policy development in Ukrainian education and higher education systems/institutions; policy and technical support in the management of diversity in culture and heritage; development of sustainable urban planning mechanisms, as well as assistance for developing youth policy and enhancement of youth participation in Ukraine.

The following projects and activities are being implemented or are proposed:

6.1. Intercultural dialogue through education

Project 1. <u>Management of inter-cultural and inter-religious diversity through education –</u> regional project

The process concerns all languages in education: languages of instruction in school, modern languages and languages of minorities.

The process involves several related steps:

- the preparation of a Country Report by the authorities describing and evaluating current policy and outlining new or planned initiatives;
- study visit by a Council of Europe Expert Group and elaboration of an Experts' Report in consultation with the authorities;
- a Round Table, or other forum, to take reflection further;
- the joint production of a forward-looking Language Education Policy Profile by the Council of Europe Expert Group

The Profile may be used as a basis for planning policy reforms.

Targeted pilot projects support regional efforts for sustainable community development, in particular in areas where cultural and heritage issues are of fundamental importance to conflict resolution, confidence-building and development.

Project 2. Kyiv Initiative - Regional Programme

The Kyiv initiative is a regional and transversal programme of cultural co-operation between five countries – Armenia, Azerbaijan, Georgia, Moldova and Ukraine. It reflects the Council of Europe's vision of sustainable development, which takes into account culture, heritage, environment protection and urban planning as interconnected elements. It fosters a trans-sectoral approach to the management of culture and cultural heritage through multilateral regional co-operation.

Project 2. <u>50/50 training course for representatives of Ukrainian youth NGOs and civil servants</u> <u>in charge of youth matter</u>

Project justification: In 2008, a 50/50 training course for Ukrainian youth NGOs and civil servants involved in youth work and youth policy at local and regional level should be organised in Strasbourg with a view to making them acquainted with the work of the Council of Europe in the youth field, in particular as regards human rights education, youth participation and non-formal learning. 50/50 meaning that half of the participants are youth NGOs and half are civil servants (25-30 participants in total).

Train youth NGO leaders and civil servants in charge of youth matters (at national and local level) to become acquainted with youth policies and the work of the Council of Europe in the field of human rights education with young people.

Develop partnership and co-operation in this respect between the authorities and civil society.

Promote the development of fan coaching programmes in Ukraine and the networking of NGOs with international projects.

Plan and implement an overall plan on international co-operation related to the preparation of the UEFA Euro 2012, together with Polish authorities, the Council of Europe, UEFA and the EU.

Organise preparation and co-ordination meetings before the tournament, as well as an evaluation meeting on international co-operation following the event.

Advise the Ukrainian authorities in the development of its anti-doping policy.
